The children of Burlington not only receive an outstanding education at Region 10 schools, but have the benefit of volunteers in the town's many organizations. 





Lifestyle & Recreation

Burlington is best characterized as a charming and scenic hill town. We have natural beauty, historic character and a strong commitment to helping our residents and businesses thrive.

For outdoor enthusiasts, half of Burlington is deemed open and recreational space, which provides access to fishing and floating in the Farmington River, numerous hiking trails and phenomenal mountain biking.

We take great pride in the quality of our Region 10 public school system that we share with Harwinton and our year-round community activities and attractions. These are many of the reasons why Connecticut Magazine and Hartford Magazine consistently rank Burlington as a top small town in which to live, work, play and visit. Here are some of Burlington's best offerings:

WILD & SCENIC RIVER

The Farmington River runs along Burlington's northeast border. The river is enjoyed by many who enjoy its beauty and who use it for recreational activities such as fly fishing, kayaking, canoeing, and tubing. In 2015, Burlington's congressional delegation introduced legislation that would designate the Lower Farmington River – including the section that runs through Burlington – as a Wild and Scenic River. This designation will ensure the long-term environmental health of the entire Farmington River watershed, as well as increase Burlington's visibility as a destination for recreational tourism.

HIKING & BIKING TRAILS

Burlington's extensive network of trails draws hikers and cyclists from across the state. From the flat, paved, and scenic Farmington River Trail to the rugged and challenging Mile of Ledges, there is something for everyone! Many of our trails, including many miles of blue-blazed trails maintained by the Connecticut Forest and Park Association, run through Sessions Woods Wildlife Management Area, the Nassahegan State Forest, and Burlington Land Trust-managed properties.

TAVERN DAY

Each September, Burlington's community organizations and businesses come together on the town green and the grounds of the historic Elton Tavern for Tavern Day, a celebration of Burlington's history and community spirit. It provides an opportunity for businesses and organizations of all sizes to promote their work and work together towards making Burlington a better place for residents and visitors alike.

LOCAL FARMS & FOODS

With a rich agricultural history and hundreds of acres of land currently devoted to this vitally important use, Burlington residents and visitors enjoy easy access to fresh, local foods and products. Several small farms, garden centers, CSAs, Christmas tree farms, and Connecticut's largest maple syrup and honey producer currently call Burlington home.

ACTIVITIES & SPORTS

Burlington has a full roster of community organizations, an active senior center, and programs for all ages at the Burlington Public Library. Additionally, the Parks and Recreation department has a number of offerings for all ages, and there are town-based and regional sports leagues, such as the Burlington Junior Soccer Association and the Farmington Valley MudHogs Football & Cheer organization. Our town has ample playing fields, trails for hiking and biking, forests to become one with nature and waterways for the angler inside you! We are Noticeably New England and we welcome you!
